In February this year, the Care Quality Commission (CQC) made an unannounced inspection at Redwell Hills Care Home which resulted in the Home being given an **OUTSTANDING RATING** for care – this is the highest rating that can be achieved. Below is an extract which appeared in the owners' of the home – Four Seasons – internal newsletter with quotes from the report:

"I'm absolutely delighted and so very proud of the team, not only do we strive to provide good care, but also respect our residents' diversity and beliefs and ensure that we preserve their dignity and privacy at all time"

PARTNERSHIP NEWS:

This month's meeting was held on Wednesday, 18th March, 2015. The Chair, Linda PEARS, stated on 12th March, 2015 she had attended a meeting concerning groups applying for grants and was informed that most applications are now done on line.

Present at the meeting was Councillor STELLING who was asked why the County Council were starting their garden waste collections so early and ending so early, start date being 19th March and end date being 15th October. Last year the end date was 29th October: this year there will only be 16 garden waste collections, last year there were 17 – Councillor STELLING said he would look into it.

The newsletter was also discussed - the editor has applied to a number of organisations for grants and been refused. The editor stated she has enough paper to print this month's edition, but if no money is forthcoming this could possibly be the last issue. It was suggested that perhaps people would be interested in sponsoring the newsletter, if anyone is interested, please get in touch. COUNCILLORS' REPORTS:

Councillors, who are now extremely frustrated, have received **YET ANOTHER** start date (mid-May) for the commencement of the new road and removal of the bridge.

Recently our Neighbourhood Warden had a 'walk about' and he was absolutely disgusted at the amount of rubbish not only on waste ground, but in people's back yards and on the streets: he was also disgusted at the amount of dog fouling on our streets, action has already taken place and more will follow: after a warning a fine will be issued. Police motor cyclists have also been out in the village in an effort to try and stop motorists speeding.

Councillors are eagerly awaiting the outcome of the independent Planning Inspector concerning the Bradley Open Cast site, which is expected in early April, 2015.

The meeting was also informed someone from Durham County Council is coming out to inspect sites which would be suitable for a Christmas tree and also for bollards.



POLICE REPORT

As usual the PACT meeting preceded the Partnership meeting on 18th March, 2015 and PCSO Michael CRAINE asked if the meeting wished to change the PACT Priority which at the moment is speeding between the traffic lights and the Hat and Feather, it was decided it should remain the same but also include parking and speeding outside the village's schools.

The meeting was also told about the dog fouling and fly tipping. As a result of patrols by PCSO Michael CRAINE, the trouble local farmers had been experiencing has now stopped – on behalf of everyone **THANK YOU Michael,** however there has been an increase in rural crime.

Between 2nd February and 11th March, 2015 the B.6309 Pont Road was targeted by Durham's Roads Policing Unit and as a result three drivers have been reported and will be going to court for excessive speeding: 12 drivers were issued with a Traffic Offence Report for excess speed: over 40 driver were verbally warned regarding their anti-social tendencies to speed and one vehicle was removed under 'Operation Takeaway'. Unfortunately, following liaison with the County Council, because of the road's gradient it is not suitable for the provision of traffic calming measures to reduce motorists' speed. The area will be monitored periodically.

A drugs warrant was executed in Willow Crescent and a quantity of cannabis recovered. A mobility scooter which had been reported stolen was later returned and a Lambretta scooter, stolen from the Stanley area was recovered from a property in Bradley Cottages area.

PCSO CRAINE informed the meeting that Durham Police are now using the new drug testing kits and shortly before midnight on the day the new legislation was introduced, a driver was stopped in the Billingham area and provided a positive roadside drug test.
