SURGERY NEWS - MISSED APPOINTMENTS:

Well done everyone, another month has passed and the decrease continues: February, 2018 had 150 missed appointments, which is equivalent to 38 per week and February, 2017 had 159 missed, equivalent to 40 per week.

This decrease isn't much but if we keep it up, it will make a huge difference by the end of the year. Waiting times for appointments can be long but this can be overcome with patients' help, if you are unable to keep your appointment please cancel it and allow someone else the chance to have it.

PARTNERSHIP NEWS:



This month's Partnership meeting was held on Wednesday, 21st March, 2018 at 6.30 p.m. in the Community Centre.

At last month's meeting questions were raised about fencing that had been erected on verges at the bottom of Durham Road, this month's meeting was informed this fencing has now been removed.

Activities to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the ending of World War One are continuing:

- (i) a cross is to be placed at Leadgate Methodist Church
- (ii) hopefully Leadgate Methodist Church will hold a World War One afternoon tea sometime in June, tickets will be available and will cost £1 each
- (iii) on 8th November, 2018 Leadgate Workingmen's Club will host a 'sing-along' attended by the Glendale Singers and the C.B.S. choir, there will be a raffle, tickets will be £1 each and children will be free

The chair of the Partnership, Miss Linda PEARS, is hoping to visit Leadgate Scouts and have them make papier-mache poppies. Monies to purchase the British Legion's 'Silent Soldiers' has been received. So far as the parade from the Old Co-op Store is concerned, nothing has yet been finalised.

An application for funding made to the Heritage Lottery Fund has been refused, however £500 has been received from the 'Project Genesis' Trust' and on 26th April, 2018 weather permitting, a presentation of the cheque will be held at the War Memorial in Durham Road, if bad weather, the presentation will take place in the Community Centre.

It would be really wonderful if everyone in the village could make just one poppy. A pattern for a simply poppy is available from the foyer of the Community Centre.

The new 40/30 m.p.h. speed signs have been erected on the road between Leadgate and Villa Real. Local Councillors are to be asked if something can be done about the huge pot holes on the road between Park Villas and Dunelm Way. Trees have been cut back on the road from Iveston to the round-a-bout at the bottom of Durham Road. Rumours are still circulating about the closure of Shotley Bridge Hospital but hopefully if this does happen, we will still have some form of hospital in the locality.

PCSO Alex CAVE was present at this month's meeting and the question of dog fouling was raised. Some of the worst affected areas are Watling Wood, the Eden Football Field and C2C track. Also it has been noticed that home owners open their doors and allow their animals to run free and this has been more noticeable during the recent snow: Council representatives are to be invited to Leadgate Primary School to talk to the children about this problem.

In last month's Newsletter, under the heading <u>MANUFACTURING DEVELOPMENT (BRADLEY</u> <u>INDUSTRIAL ESTATE - t</u>his extension (if approved by Durham County Council Planning) will be at the top area of Werdohl Way with minimal incursion into <u>Bradley Wood – this should have read Watling Wood</u>.




POLICE REPORT




