THE 'EDDY PROJECT'

On Friday, 16th May, I was present at at Redwell Hills Care Home when it was presented with two 'planted up' flower pots. The actual plant pots had been confiscated as a result of drug raids in the area and rather than have them wasted it was felt they should be put to good use and were given to the 'Eddy Project'. This project which stands for ENGAGE, DIVERT, DEVELOP YOUNG PEOPLE, operates from what had been an unusable allotment at Blackhill Allotments. It has been running since September, 2012 and caters for young people between the ages of 12 - 17 years and everyone is welcome. The project is run by Durham Agency Against Crime and supported by Durham Constabulary, P.C. Ian ROBERTSON being the project's co-ordinator.

A total of ten planted pots were given to the village and the other eight were distributed as follows, two each to 'Haven House', Brooms Primary School, Leadgate Infants and Nursery School and Leadgate Junior School.



CENTENARY ANNIVERSARY:

No reports this month as both were attending the Annual General Meeting of the Derwentside Area Action Partnership on the same evening. Presentations were also being made and amongst the awards given out were one each to Mrs. Ann FOREMAN and Mr. Cecil WATSON for their

Willow Burn Hospice. Kay, who was only 14, shaved her long hair, which when cut, measured 10" and has been sent to a wig maker. Congratulations and well done to all three.



POLICE REPORT (PACT MEETING)

The PACT meeting was held prior to the Partnership Meeting on Wednesday, 21st May, 2014 and for another month the PACT Priority is parking issues at Leadgate Junior School. In an effort to improve this situation there have a number of high visibility patrols and the yellow lines have been repainted. The

question was asked if the zig zag lines could be extended but the short answer to this is NO because of regulations. The Head Teacher at the school is of the opinion that as a result of the police patrols speeding has been reduced. Over the last two months there has been no trouble at Leadgate Methodist Church.

An incident occurred on Durham Road which involved a group of males fighting and this resulted in a car being damaged: one male was dealt with by means of Restorative Justice and has compensated the owner of the vehicle. Three local males, who had been using a dog to flush out deer, have been cautioned for poaching deer, the caution was issued as they had no previous convictions. Whilst searching properties in the Green Street and Pont Bungalows areas, stolen property and cannabis was received: cautions were issued in respect of the cannabis but enquiries are ongoing in respect of the recovered stolen property. The police are appealing for information as to the identity of a possible witness to an offence of criminal damage which occurred in Green Street, the person concerned is male and was wearing a white hooded top and was riding a pedal cycle.

Local officers have now been trained in the use of hand held speed guns, which are being operational on the four roads leading into Leadgate. If stopped for speeding, a Fixed Penalty Notice for $\pounds 100$ will be issued and more importantly, the offender will have three penalty points placed on their driving licence.

On Friday, 2nd May, 2014 about 4.45 p.m. on Neal Street, Annfield Plain, a motor vehicle collided with a teenage boy. Durham Police are trying to trace a man and a woman who were in the vehicle and who are thought to be in their twenties, the vehicle is believed to be a red Vauxhall Corsa car, about two years old. Anyone with information that could lead to the identity of the individuals described is asked to contact P.C. Phil HARDMAN from the Road Policing Union on the non-emergency number 101.

FOCUS ON LEADGATE:

We, as residents of Leadgate, have a chance to get involved with Durham County Council's Community Action Team (CAT) to look at what may be needed to improve the neighbourhood. An eight week programme has already started with the CAT team being out and about in Leadgate. A public meeting was held on 14th May, 2014 and one drop-in session on 19th May. Two further drop-in sessions are being held in the Community Centre on Monday, 2nd and 9th June, 2014. As well as identifying priorities CAT will look at housing, environment and health issues, ranging from improving housing standards and management of privately rented property to advice on health and well-being.

CAT is led by Durham County Council's Environment, Health and Consumer Protection team, together with local Councillors, work with other agencies including Durham Constabulary, Durham and Darlington Fire and Rescue and the NHS Health Improvement Service to tackle environmental and private housing issues.
