SURGERY NEWS - MISSED APPOINTMENTS:

In July 159 patients did not attend appointments, this was another monthly decrease - this figure is equivalent to 40 per week and 37 hours of time wasted: however in August, there was an increase – 177 patients did not attend – equivalent to 45 per week and 45 hours' time wasted

In June 170 patients did not attend, this is equivalent to 42 per week and 40 hours of time wasted.

May, 2017 - 203 patients did not attend, an average of 50 per week: time wasted 50 hours

April, 2017 - 141 patients did not attend: an average of 35 per week: time wasted 34 hours

Don't forget, our surgery offers an appointment texting service. If you have a mobile phone, inform the receptionists who will text you the day prior to your appointment, hopefully this will limit the number of missed appointments. Waiting times for appointments can be long but this can be overcome with patients' help, if you are unable to keep your appointment, please cancel it and allow someone else the chance to have it." PARTNERSHIP NEWS:



This month's Partnership meeting was held on Wednesday, 20th September, 2017 at 6.30 p.m. in the Community Centre.

An update was given on the work being done by Groundwork in Watling Wood and it appears that two thirds of it has now been carried out, two seats have been provided, a boardwalk and pond dipping. The question of possibly providing a running track was mentioned – the question of funding was raised, permission would be required, people would be unable to use it in the winter months and finally disturbance to wildlife was mentioned.

It has been suggested that the village hold a celebration in 2018 to mark the 100th anniversary of the ending of World War One. The Partnership is to write to all organisations in the village and ask a representative from each to attend the October meeting to discuss what we should do.

Funding has now been received from our local councillors, Alan SHIELD and Watts STELLING for the continuance of this newsletter, as editor of the newsletter, on behalf of everyone, I offer Alan and Watts our thanks.

A Community Garden project was discussed, this project is to encourage people to 'grow their own'. The old tennis court beside the Bowling Club is the proposed site and Leadgate Taskforce has been given a 10 year lease. A fence is to be provided, it is hoped to have the school involved, the court surface will not be dug up and nothing will be permanent

The last thing to be mentioned was the sponsorship money for the village's planters, the money f,50, is now due.



<u>VILLA REAL BRIDGE/NEW ROAD</u> – Speeding traffic using this road is still a high priority and some speed monitoring by Durham Traffic Police is still occurring. Following a consultation with local residents in Leadgate and Villa Real Bungalows, Durham County Council (DCC) has proposed the introduction of a buffer 40 m.p.h.

speed limit between Leadgate (after the island crossing) and Villa Real Bungalows, this will enable additional 30 m.p.h. roundel signs to be erected (at the island crossing) reminding motorists that they are entering Leadgate Village and that a 30 m.p.h. speed limit is in place. An alternative proposal to withdraw the buffer zone and install a 'flashing speed visor' (Slow – 30 m.p.h.) before entering Leadgate Village has been submitted by a local councillor – this option should be considered by DCC Highways & Traffic Police.

The current 7.5 tonne weight limit restriction, implementing an alternative 18 tonne weight limit is still to be progressed – this will reduce the occurrences of H.G.V.'s using the back streets to exit Leadgate Village.

EDEN MINERS' INSTITUTE HALL (THE 'TUTE') – the Leadgate Youth Centre ceased to operate following the withdrawal of funding by DCC as part of austerity savings, however, four new members to supplement the current Trustee member are progressing the introduction of new organisations/groups to ensure the full utilization and development of the building.

Derwent Valley Allstars – a cheerleading/gymnastics group will have specific and sole access to the upper hall on five weekday evenings (6pm - 9pm)


Leadgate Toddler Group – local residents are proposing the provision of a child/toddler group for three weekdays – further progress to be developed.

This building has the potential to implement additional facilities to eventually progress 'The Tute' to become a Community Hub and the Trustee Board welcome any enquiries from interested parties.

<u>THE ROXY</u> – a local builder/entrepreneur (Mr. Keith BARRON) has been working on a long term project converting this building to a type of Community Centre providing conference, stage, educational and many other workshop type facilities. Councillors have arranged a joint meeting with Business Durham to try and provide resources to stimulate and quicken the progress to full completion.

SHOTLEY BRIDGE COMMUNITY HOSPITAL – the NHS is to undertake a review on the operational set up of the Hospital which is currently estimated at £1.8 million per annum: this review will consider various options given that there is a maintenance backlog requirement of £2 million with further infrastructure work which increased the overall cost to £4 million. Derwentside Councillors met with CCG Board members in November, 2016 and were given assurances that ensure Community Hospital provision in Shotley Bridge/Consett locality – DCC have set up a Members (4 councillors) and a 4 Officer Group to work alongside CCG/NHS Officers to represent and strive to deliver the needs of the local community.
