This year's Remembrance Day Service will be held on Sunday, 12th November, 2017 at 10.30 a.m. at the War Memorial in Durham Road. For the last few years the service has been attend by more and more people wishing to pay their respects to those people who paid the ultimate price for freedom, let's see if we can continue this trend.

On Friday, 3rd November, 2017 at 7 p.m. Consett Festival of Remembrance will be held in Consett Empire Theatre, in aid of the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal. Tickets are £7.50 each and are available from Consett Empire Theatre or payment can be made at the door; this event is supported by Local Councillors and other local organisations.

On 25th September, 2017 the village said a fond farewell to its very popular vicar, Father David CLEUGH, who, together with his wife, Hannah, have moved to pastures new, namely Cambridge. Father David has become vicar of Fordham, Isleham, Chippenham, Kennet and Snailwell, whilst Hannah has become Chaplain to the Bishop of Ely. On the morning of Friday 20th October, 2017, several members of St. Ives' Church went down to Cambridge to attend the investiture of Father David which took place later that night and to attend the investiture of Hannah, which took place on the morning of Saturday, 21st October.

In his leaving speech, Father David said one the main reasons he accepted the appointment of vicar of St. Ives was because of the toilets - they have lovely toilet paper and scented soap. PARTNERSHIP NEWS:

This month's partnership meeting took place on 18th October, 2017 at 6.30 p.m. in the Community Centre and was mainly concerned with what our village would like to do in 2018 the mark the 100th anniversary of the ending of World War One. Obviously there will be a Remembrance Service at the War Memorial in the Durham Road and it was suggested that perhaps there could be a parade, possibly starting at the former Co-op Building, along Front Street, turning right into Durham Road and then to the War Memorial, where the Remembrance Service would commence with the re-dedication of the War Memorial.

Pupils of the schools in our area are to be asked what they think about World War One and for them to put their thoughts into drawings, the best of which could be made into a Christmas card, it was also suggested that the children's drawing could be placed on the fencing surrounding the schools. It was also suggested that perhaps the 'Christmas Day Football' match could take place, but of course no one wants to come out on Christmas Day but then someone thought the actual match took place on Christmas Eve. Another suggestion was a village cricket match, where everyone dresses up. It was also suggested that cornflower and poppy seeds be planted around the village and also that knitted poppies be displayed in various locations, the ladies of the Methodist Church have already started knitting and members of the Community Centre's Chat and Natter Club will also be doing their bit. A tea dance was also mentioned and as the hall of the Methodist Church has a sprung floor it was thought that could be a possible venue.

The above are just a few of the suggestions put forward and it was agreed to have another meeting on 5th December, 2017 at 6.30 p.m. in the Community Centre. COUNCILLORS' REPORTS:

VILLA REAL BRIDGE/NEW ROAD: The issue regarding the introduction of a buffer 40 m.p.h. speed limit between Leadgate (after the island crossing) and Villa Real Bungalows, enabling additional 30 m.p.h. roundel signs to be erected reminding motorists that they are entering Leadgate Village and that a 30 m.p.h. speed limit is in place has been referred to Durham County Council (DCC) Highways Committee following an objection submitted by a local member. An alternative proposal to withdraw the buffer zone and install a 'flashing speed visor' (Slow – 30mph) before entering Leadgate Village has been submitted by another local councillor - this will probably be discussed at the same committee meeting.

EDEN MINERS INSTITUTE HALL – 'THE TUTE' – the new Trustee Board has been established and has agreed the new name for this facility is to be the **EDEN MINERS CENTRE** and that the Derwent Valley Allstars – a cheerleading/gymnastics group will have specific and sole access to the upper hall on five weekday evenings (4pm – 9pm) – this arrangement is likely to commence at the end of 2017 or early 2018 following some structural improvements/alterations. The lower hall/rooms are available for access to other local organisations to promote the development of a Community Hub and the Trustee Board welcome any enquiries from interested parties.

SHOTLEY BRIDGE COMMUNITY HOSPITAL: The first meeting with the NHS and CCG has taken place and a frank discussion between local councillors and DCC Officers and NHS Officers took place regarding the range of options being considered. It was emphasised that Derwentside has the fastest rate of population growth in Co. Durham and the North East region mainly attributable to the numerous housing developments in and around the Consett area, with the largest age groups being under 14's and over 65's – this information helped justify the reason for a Community Hospital provision in Shotley Bridge/Consett locality – discussions are ongoing.


