
LEADGATE's NEWS

PARTNERSHIP NEWS:



This month's Partnership meeting took place on Wednesday, 20th November, 2013 in the Community Centre. Under the heading 'Matters Arising' the question of the tennis courts was brought up. In last month's Newsletter the question was asked, was anyone interested in starting a new tennis club? Unfortunately, I didn't have any replies but Councillor STELLING had an e mail from a resident who said if a club was started he would be interested. However, the ground is now not in the best of order and new tarmac would have to be laid and everything would have to be replaced. Also under the same heading, the footpath around the bowling green should read outside the bowling club.

The placement of the four new planters, which are smaller than the existing ones, was decided – two would be placed in Durham Road, one at the Doctor's Surgery and one in Watling Street: the question of sponsorship for these new planters was raised and if you would like to become a sponsor, please contact **Mrs. Patricia PICKERSGILL, Secretary** of the Partnership **on 01207 507606**. The Food Bank situated in the Salvation Army Hall, Consett has now moved to Glenroyd House. To qualify for a food parcel people have to be referred from the Job Centre, Citizens' Advices or the Health Service, if anyone attends the Food Bank without a referral they will be told where they can obtain a referral.

The meeting was told a recent application to Christ's Hospital in Sherburn, Durham for a grant to continue the Newsletter had been unsuccessful: an application will have to be made elsewhere.



COUNCILLORS' REPORTS:

Councillor STELLING commented on the fantastic turn out this year at our village's memorial service and said there was also a service at Iveston. It was also noted police speed cameras had recently been present in the village and the police were also keeping a watchful eye on Watling Wood in view of the recent damage caused to the dams. Durham County Council has put pipes in to stop flooding and as this is Council property anyone

found causing damage will be severely dealt with. The Derwent Valley Area Action Partnership's recent Your Money, Your Area, Your View project was discussed. The money to fund this project comes from the 'Participation Budget and Councillors STELLING and SHIELD feel the allocation of the money has flaws, whilst the turn out this year was once again admirable, the larger organisations benefited over the smaller ones. Leadgate had three projects participating, Leadgate Carers, Open Arms and Leadgate Cricket Club, however only the Cricket Club was successful.



POLICE REPORT:

The winter nights are here and the police are concentrating on crime prevention around leaving your house in darkness. Dedicated Police and Neighbourhood Wardens are conducting patrols to target offenders and reduce crime by prevention. Winter Nights leaflets are being distributed street by street.

LOCAL COMMUNITY: A male was arrested for theft of two motor vehicles, charged with these offences and also driving whilst disqualified and other offences – he was remanded in custody to await trial. **OPERATION WHITEHALL** which targets scrap collections throughout the Consett area has had positive results, leading to a decline in illegal collectors. **CURRENT TREND**: Sporadic thefts of motor vehicles, stolen with keys after the house has been left insecure, vehicle keys then used to steal vehicles. Burglaries from dwellinghouses and out buildings and various items stolen. In Leadgate and Consett an increase in dedicated patrols to apprehend offenders and promote crime prevention methods.




WORKING TOGETHER:




HOW's THIS FOR A BONFIRE


